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4 SYNOPSIS:

5 The Joint Transportation Committee was created 6 to review and consider long-term strategic planning of 7 highway construction and highway development in the 8 state and to prepare and review certain reports 9 regarding the Department of Transportation. Currently the Department of Transportation collects and submits 10 11 to the Joint Transportation Committee a report that details the total amount of local motor fuel excise tax 12 13 revenues collected by counties or cities for the 14 immediately preceding fiscal year and the total amount 15 of the revenues expended on road and bridge maintenance and improvement during that same fiscal year. 16

17 This bill would transfer that responsibility of 18 creating the report from the Department of 19 Transportation to the Department of Revenue. This bill 20 would also transfer the responsibility for the annual 21 performance report on the Department of Transportation 22 in terms of highway construction, maintenance, and 23 costs of the same from the Joint Transportation 24 Committee to the Department of Examiners of Public 25 Accounts.

41	improvement during that same fiscal year; and to require the
42	Department of Examiners of Public Accounts rather than the
43	Joint Transportation Committee to complete an annual report of
44	the performance of the Department of Transportation in terms
45	of highway construction, maintenance, and costs of the same.
46	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA:
47	Section 1. Section 29-2-4, Code of Alabama 1975, as
48	last amended by Act 2023-534 of the 2023 Regular Session, is
49	amended as follows:
50	"\$29-2-4
51	(a) On or before January 31 of each year, any county or
52	city required to report local motor fuel excise tax rate
53	information to the Department of Revenue pursuant to Act

54 1998-192 shall provide a similar report to the transportation 55 department <u>Department of Revenue</u> regarding the total amount of 56 local motor fuel excise tax revenues collected by the county



57 or city for the immediately preceding fiscal year and the 58 total amount of the revenues expended on road and bridge 59 maintenance and improvement during that same fiscal year. The 60 transportation department Department of Revenue shall collect 61 the information and deliver a report to the Joint Transportation Committee on or before March 31 of each year. 62

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(b) The powers and duties of the Joint Transportation 64 Committee shall be as follows:

65 (1) It shall review and shall consider concurring with the long-range plan of the transportation department as such 66 67 plan exists at the date of the meeting called for the purpose of reviewing the plan. The long-range plan referred to herein 68 is the Statewide Transportation Improvement Program (STIP) 69 70 maintained by ALDOT for the purpose of complying with 71 requirements of the Federal Highway Administration, which plan is amended multiple times each year for administrative as well 72 73 as substantive reasons, and which plan shall be constantly 74 available on the ALDOT website. A member of the committee may 75 propose an amendment to the STIP, provided that the proposed 76 amendment is delivered in writing to the transportation 77 department by the close of business of the fourth Wednesday 78 after the draft plan is presented to the committee. The 79 proposed amendment shall be fiscally constrained within the 80 funding category shown in the draft STIP. The transportation 81 department shall prepare and deliver the amendment to each 82 member of the committee no later than the fourth Wednesday of the month prior to the next quarterly meeting. Should the 83 84 committee, by majority vote, accept the proposed amendment,



85 the amendment shall be delivered by the chair of the committee 86 to the Governor for consideration of changing the STIP as 87 presented by the transportation department.

88 (2) The update of the transportation department's 89 annual fund allocation plan shall be presented to the Joint 90 Transportation Committee at the third quarterly meeting of 91 each year. The review and consideration of concurrence in the 92 annual update of the plan shall be accomplished by the Joint 93 Transportation Committee no later than the last quarterly meeting of each year. Failure of the Joint Transportation 94 95 Committee to concur in the annual update shall not prevent the transportation department from proceeding with any project. 96

97 (3) The transportation department's requested budget 98 for the following fiscal year shall be presented to the Joint 99 Transportation Committee at the last guarterly meeting of the year. It shall review the budget proposed by the 100 101 transportation department on an annual basis, which review 102 shall be completed not later than the first quarterly meeting 103 of each year. The Joint Transportation Committee shall report 104 on the budget requests of the transportation department to the 105 House Ways and Means General Fund Committee and the Senate 106 Finance and Taxation General Fund Committee and may make 107 recommendations about the budget to the committees.

(4) An in-progress draft of the annual report outlined
in Section 23-1-35 shall be presented to the Joint
Transportation Committee at the first quarterly meeting of
each year. All comments and input from members of the Joint
Transportation Committee shall be delivered to the



113 transportation department within 30 days of the first 114 quarterly meeting to allow consideration by the transportation 115 department prior to publishing.

116 (5) The transportation department shall prepare and 117 submit for review by the Joint Transportation Committee a 118 long-range plan for the transportation department utilizing 119 objective prioritization criteria consistent with the factors 120 described in subdivision (11) at the first quarterly meeting 121 of the year. The plan shall include a narrative of the condition of the transportation department as well as forward 122 123 looking challenges and opportunities. The intent of this requirement is to allow the Joint Transportation Committee to 124 125 assist in avoiding future problems and challenges and to 126 assist in the development of goals for the transportation 127 department. This plan may be incorporated into the annual report as required by Section 23-1-35 or be prepared as a 128 129 separate document.

130 (6) Upon request of the chair, or by a majority vote of 131 the members of the Joint Transportation Committee, the 132 Department of Examiners of Public Accounts It shall issue a 133 report to the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, House of 134 Representatives, and Senate within 60 days of the second 135 quarterly meeting, comparing actual performance of the 136 transportation department in terms of highway construction, 137 maintenance, and costs of the same, to the original plan for the immediate preceding fiscal year as well as the five 138 preceding fiscal years. It shall also make this report 139 140 available to the public within 70 days of the second quarterly



141 meeting.

142 (7) It shall recommend to the Governor necessary
143 funding for future transportation department budgets to the
144 extent necessary beyond funds already provided by law.

145 (8) It may retain the services of consultants, if
146 necessary, and consult with other groups and individuals,
147 including public interest groups, interested individuals, and
148 appropriate state educational institutions.

(9) It may hold public hearings, shall make diligent inquiry and a full examination of the long-range future highway needs of the state, and shall file all reports of its findings and recommendations with both houses of the Legislature and with the Governor.

(10) It may call witnesses and do all things necessary or convenient in connection with and all things incidental to performance of the foregoing duties and powers.

(11) In performing its functions, the Joint
Transportation Committee shall take into consideration, in
reviewing plans for highway construction and maintenance,
among other factors all of the following:

a. Commuter benefits in the total amount of direct
savings to working men and women traveling to and from their
jobs in the state.

- b. Industrial and agricultural growth.
- 165 c. Transportation safety.

166 d. Ecological impacts of transportation projects.

- 167 e. Recreation and tourism.
- 168 f. Traffic density.



g. Implications on the routing of school buses. 169 170 h. Implications on the operation of public safety and 171 first responder vehicles. 172 i. Priority to projects in a location with an 173 independent local assessment. 174 j. Priority to projects that provide a county with its first four-lane access to an interstate." 175 176 Section 2. This act shall become effective on June 1,
